Position Summary

Public Policy and International Relations Internship in Washington, D.C. Sponsored by the Nebraska Corn Board (NCB) and the U.S. Grains Council (USGC)

About

The Nebraska Corn Board manages the corn checkoff investment by striving to connect corn producers to their customers, new products and markets, important research and policymakers on Capitol Hill. We aim to capture the greatest value for corn producers amidst an ever-changing industry.

The U.S. Grains Council is a private, non-profit organization that develops export markets for U.S. barley, corn, grain sorghum and related products. The Council believes exports are vital to global economic development and to U.S. agriculture's profitability. The main office is located in Washington, D.C. with ten overseas offices: China, Mexico, Egypt, Taiwan, Japan, Tunisia, South Korea, Jordan, Malaysia and Panama.

Timeline

Duties & Responsibilities

Intern would be mentored and assigned responsibilities on a day-to-day basis by the USGC staff Students will obtain a working knowledge of the following:

- Office operations of the USGC
- Meeting USCG leadership and supporting their efforts
- Inter-relationships of other ag and ag industry groups in D.C.
- Hands-on work with the Council's members such as the National Corn Growers Association, National Sorghum Producers,
 National Barley Growers Association and agribusinesses on U.S. domestic issues on the Hill
- Understanding trade policies in the U.S. and other countries
- The importance of working with membership cooperators
- · Opportunities to represent USGC as assigned in meetings and reporting back to staff
- Assisting with coordinating international trade teams
- Knowledge gained on Farm Bill, International Trade Policy, Market Development, Value of International Trade, Global Food Security, Grain Supply and Reliability, Biotechnology, and much more

Qualifications

Any student enrolled in a four-year university with the following qualifications:

- · Agricultural background beneficial but not required
- Interest in the political process, trade and agricultural economics
- Proven communication abilities in written and verbal forms of communications
- Excellent computer skills
- Sophomore standing or above

Agricultural Statistics, Ag Policy, Agricultural Economics, International Agriculture/Marketing, Political Science and Communications

Stipend

Nebraska Corn Board will provide a \$6,000 cost of living stipend which will be paid to the student, as well as one flight transportation to and from D.C. Prefer student to coordinate with the NCB/NCGA intern on travel expenses. Housing suggestions will be provided.

Opportunity for Independent Study

Will work with the University to receive credit hours.
